Supporters hope to stir awareness of ASDs during 'Autism Month'

Autism spectrum disorders now affect 1.4 per cent of Quebec's population

During an official launch last week for Laval Autism Month — which takes place throughout April — The Société de l'Autisme de Laval announced that this year's co-chairs will be Alexandre Poirier-Charlebois, author of a book on his experiences as someone with Asperger's Syndrome, and Guy Picard, general manager of the Société de Transport de Laval (STL).

Big turnout for launch

Ā press conference held on March 26 at the Embassy Plaza for the launch drew a large number of community group leaders and other officials with an interest or stake in seeing that those afflicted with autism spectrum disorders receive the attention they deserve during this month of special events.

"The important thing for everybody here today is what can we do for people with ASDs [autism spectrum disorders]," said Germain Lafrenière, executive-director of the Société de l'autisme de des troubles envahissants du développement de Laval, which is coordinating organization for the month.

Guest author has Asperger's

Alexandre Poirier-Charlebois, who attends Université du Québec à Montréal, wrote Ma vie avec l'Asperger. He said he is currently working on a second book. He also is a frequent speaker at elementary and high schools on autism spectrum disorders. As well, he has been critical of the Quebec educational system's failure to adapt to the needs of persons with autism.

The STL's Guy Picard said it was a great honor to be chosen as the co-chair for Autism Month in Laval. "The STL is front and centre when it comes to the activities of Laval's citizens," he said. "It's written in our mission statement that our job is to improve the quality of life of people



in Laval. So, being here today is only natural."

Rousselle learned about it

Vimont MNA Jean Rousselle said he came to understand the impact of autism through one of this office employees who has an autistic child. "When you're not affected by it, you just don't understand what it's all about," he said, while maintaining that a certain amount of responsibility for understanding falls upon employers.

"We must facilitate help for parents like these who live day after day with autism spectrum disorders. For example, they can sometimes need special daycares and things like that. I know, because of the employee who tells me about it, which is how I've come to know it. But this is why I am appealing to employers to also think about it: Try to make it a little easier parents and families like these and perhaps try to do things a little differently to accommodate them."

'Very sensitive,' says Borne

The message that Laval city councillor for the district of Laval-Les Îles Nicholas Borne said he wanted to get across was that those affected by an autism spectrum disorder contribute to the

well-being of our society. Borne said he'd had the privilege of knowing several persons like this since one of his nephews was diagnosed with an autism spectrum disorder.

"So generally, even if such persons have had this diagnosis and experience certain difficulties interacting or having relationships with others, they are nonetheless, just like my nephew, very sensitive people who are very conscious of the differences between us. And they can sometimes feel slighted by certain ways they get looked at or how they're spoken to. But just like each of us, those afflicted with autism spectrum disorders want to be accepted and we do everything to achieve that."

City of Laval has made efforts

Councillor Borne pointed out that the City of Laval over the past five years or so has taken special measures to accommodate families and persons who are impacted by autism. "While the diagnosis of autism spectrum disorders is steadily growing, we consider it essential to inform the population," he said. "That's why Autism Month exists – to support and inform and to learn about our differences."

Gary Stoopler, director of programs for the

intellectually challenged at CISSS de Laval, pointed out that autism affects around 1.4 per cent of the population of Quebec. While maintaining that Autism Month is a time to raise awareness, he added that it's also useful to alter many people's preconceptions "which are the principal obstacle to integrating persons with an autism spectrum disorder into the community."

Autism events all month

While praising all the groups in Laval that share a common mission of improving life for those with autism, Stoopler said everyone stands to benefit from their work by gaining a better understanding of autism spectrum disorders. The events in Laval for Autism Month include a number of lectures (in French), given by experts in the domain.

As well, on April 27 at the Château Royal beginning at 5 pm, the organizers will be holding a special gathering, Cocktail en Bleu. There is a \$15 admission charge for some of the lectures, while tickets for the cocktail event are \$50. As well, a number of other organizations and groups, including the STL, are sponsoring events in April to raise awareness of autism.



Mayor Marc Demers pleased with Quebec's 2018 budget

Preferential lanes on A-15 and funds for STL garage in budget

(TLN) Mayor Marc Demers reacted favourably last week to Quebec Finance Minister Carlos Leitão's 2018 provincial budget which contained measures favourable to the City of Laval.

According to the mayor, the announced addition of reserved public transit lanes on Autoroute 15, as well as additional investments towards the extension of Autoroute 19, are steps in the right direction, although he said more efforts will be needed to take care of traffic problems in Laval and on the North Shore.

Traffic concerns

We will be meeting on April 23 to discuss the means that would allow us to better deal with the current traffic situation, but also the traffic situation that is bound to develop in the coming decades because of the economic and demographic growth of

the municipalities taking part in the Forum," said Demers. "We are taking stock of the today's announcements, although we will stay on guard as to their being carried out in the years to come."

The mayor was pleased by the announcement of funding by the government for the construction of a new garage for STL buses. He was also happy to hear about fund transfers amounting to \$60 million by Quebec over two years to municipalities that need to make adjustments in their policies so as to take into account the legalization of cannabis

Social housing and families

These investments are more than welcome, considering that just for training and the cost of new equipment we estimate \$1.5 million will be necessary," he said. The mayor was also pleased

to see that sums were in the budget to assist families, including funding for social housing, for additional measures to deal with conjugal and sexual violence, as well as for assistance for senior citizens and for children.

As well, Mayor Demers expressed satisfaction with the fact the government included measures to encourage the development of small and medium-size businesses and enterprises in the 2018 budget. "Since the economic fabric of Laval is made up essentially of SMEs, we are pleased to see that Quebec deployed measures encouraging their competitiveness by gradually reducing from 8 per cent to 4 per cent the income tax for businesses in the services and construction sectors," he said.

Laval moving ahead with 292 new units of social housing

\$4.39 million allotted for Val-Martin, Pie-X and Athena's Shield projects

(TLN) During a special meeting of Laval city council on March 27, city officials confirmed that major investments will be made towards building 292 new units of community and social housing in Laval as part of a provincial AccèsLogis subsidy program.

Through the program, whose financing is shared equally by the City of Laval and the Société d'habitation du Québec, Accès Logis projects will be taking place at Val-Martin, Pie-X and Athena's Shield with the additional support of \$4,389,714.

Words into action

We believe in social housing and we are taking the means to allow our citizens to access quality affordable housing in a neighbourhood that's nice," said Mayor Marc Demers, "Our housing policy which was unveiled in June 2017 is aimed at positioning us as a leader in this matter. These investments concretize our aim which is to encourage social inclusion and the overall well-being of everyone in Laval."

The following social housing projects in Laval are moving ahead

1. Val-Martin Project

Number of units: 233

Financial support: \$3,607,129

Description: Construction of community and social housing for families with low and moderate incomes, as well as a municipal community centre. The revitalization of this are of Chomedey is part of some urban development projects by the city identified in the main urban plan.

2. Pie-X Project

Number of units: 42

Caisse de Chomedey

Financial support: \$546,254

Description: Construction of housing aimed at allowing persons with low or moderate incomes to access housing at a

reasonable price.
3. Athena's Shield Project

Number of units: 17

Financial support: \$236,331

Description: Construction of housing aimed at a clientele with particular needs, with special services available for them.

According to Councillor Nicholas Borne, who is president of the Laval Municipal Housing Office as well as the city council committee responsible for social housing, nearly a quarter of families in Laval live in housing that is not affordable in comparison to the amount of revenue available to them.

"Our goal is to make sure there is enough clean and safe housing for these families, while encouraging diversity," he said. "We remain set on this goal, inspired by our regional policy for social development, so that a the greatest number of residents are able to live in these units of housing."



Bill C-59's overreach allows security to trump freedom

Bill C-59, Canada's new spy legislation, threatens the freedom of expression, the right to life, liberty and the security of the person

Diefenbaker said, "We must vigilantly stand on guard within our own borders for human rights and fundamental freedoms which are our proud heritage. ... We cannot take for granted the continuance and maintenance of those rights and freedoms."

But critics warn that Bill C-59, Canada's new spy legislation, threatens the freedom of expression, the right to life, liberty and the security of the person, and the right to be secure from unreasonable search or

Bill C-59 ("An act respecting national security matters," according to the official literature) is the Trudeau government's response to the much-maligned Bill C-51, which was enacted after the Parliament

ne-time Prime Minister John Hill shooting. The former legislation gave new powers to Canadian spy agencies with inadequate protections of privacy and democratic oversight. The new legislation purports to address these problems, but experts suggest it's even worse.

In December, academics at the Citizens Lab and the Canadian Interest Policy and Public Internet Clinic (CIPPIC) at the University of Toronto issued their alarming analysis of C-59. The authors warn: "From mass dissemination of false information, to impersonation, leaking foreign documents in order to influence political and legal outcomes, disabling account or network access, large-scale denial of service attacks, and interference with the electricity grid, the possibilities for the types of activities contemplated in (Bill C-59) are limited only by the imagination."

The report says the documents leaked by U.S. National Security Agency whistleblower Edward Snowden in 2013 showed experts that Canada's Communications Security Establishment (CSE) was already spying far more than previously known.

Such non-targeted mass surveillance was seen by many to affront international law and our Charter of Rights and Freedoms. Bill C-59 seems an effort to legitimize this activity by putting it more explicitly into law, then pushes the bounds even further.

The report explains, "A foreign intelligence authorization allows the CSE to engage in any otherwise unlawful activity, 'despite any other act of Parliament or of any foreign state," subject to Subsection 25(2) of the CSE Act. In Paragraph 27(2)

(e), the new act allows the CSE to engage in "any other activity that is reasonable in the circumstances and reasonably necessary in aid of any other activity, or class of activity, authorized by the authorization." In other words, the CSE can ignore any law it likes if it deems it best.

What then of oversight?

C-59 creates a National Security and Intelligence Review Agency to review and investigate the activities of the CSE and the Canadian Security Intelligence Service. It would also create an intelligence commissioner to provide independent and quasi-judicial oversight over these agencies.

Unfortunately, the commissioner doesn't need to be consulted or approve any use of the new cyber operations. They need only the approval of the ministers of Defence and Foreign Affairs.

The bill is in its early stages and can still be revised. To this end, the CIPPIC report has 54 recommendations to improve the bill and make it more charter-compliant. Proposed changes place a stronger leash on the CSE by strengthening the intelligence commissioner's role and authority, clarifying terms of the legislation, and narrowing the scope of the proposed spying powers.

Advocates such as OpenMedia are collecting names on a petition that calls on the government to accept the report's recommendations.

Unjust legislation can't be allowed in the name of security. As former prime minister Pierre Trudeau said, "I recognize that in some cases it's more important to have freedom and justice than to have peace." Hopefully, the government will recognize this principle and the Charter of Rights and Freedoms that Trudeau created.

Charbonneau: Quebec Liberal government planning five years ahead in budget

\$16 billion extra set aside for long range public investments

TLN) The Laval region's six Quebec MNAs say the Liberal government's latest budget contains a number of measures that stand to improve the quality of life of the residents of Laval, while also encouraging economic and financial stability throughout the province.

Health and education

The government's 2018 budget makes provision for the next five years, setting aside \$16 billion in additional funding for the province's long range investments as set out in the Quebec Economic Plan. Among other things, that plan includes greater investment in health and education.



"The March 2018 Quebec Economic Plan contains numerous measures which improve the quality of life of the citizens of our region while supporting the development of our businesses and our economy," said Mille-Îles Liberal MNA Francine Charbonneau, who is Minister Responsible for the Region of Laval.

'Impressive progress'

The progress made over the past few years is impressive and today we have a solid base on which to build a modern and prosperous Quebec for the benefit of our children and grand-children in all the regions of Quebec,"

"Over the last few years, we took our responsibilities by putting the house in order and by creating a financial and economic environment that allowed Quebec to record its strongest economic growth in nearly 20 years," said Finance Minister Carlos Leitão. "Ouebecers are the first to benefit from this financial and economic improvement."

Reducing the debt

The Liberal government says it intends to make major investments in public services and infrastructures, while working to reduce the burden of its debt. According to the government, the province's economy is running at full strength, with a Gross Domestic Product that went from 1.4 per cent in 2016 to 3 per cent in 2017 - the largest gain in two decades.

At the same time, employment grew and over the past four years 222,600 jobs were created in Quebec, says the government. The Liberal government says it remains committed to creating an additional 250,000 jobs over the next five years, ahead of schedule. In the meantime, the unemployment rate in Quebec (6.1 per cent) is lower than the average for the rest of Canada (6.3 per cent).

Cutting debt service costs

According to the government, the currently excellent state of the economy suggests the time is ripe to work on reducing Quebec's overall debt with payments of \$2 billion per year over the next five years, using the province's Fonds des générations. This reduction, says the government, will correspondingly cut costs for servicing the debt by \$1 billion over five years. At the same time, the government intends to keep paying into the Generations Fund.

The government says it will be making mayor investments in education and health. Among other things, they plan on spending \$16 billion in the public education and higher education sectors on new classrooms, new gymnasiums and sports facilities, and \$19 billion in the public health and social services sectors, allowing for the modernization of health infrastructure.

Tax credits in budget

The 2018 budget allots funding for families, including refundable tax credits for children's

davcare services, a non refundable tax credit on the purchase of a new home. There are also tax credits for caregivers to senior citizens.

In addition, the government is focusing on sustainable mobility in the latest budget, with

three major transit projects receiving \$13.5 billion in support: the Montreal region's REM train, the extension of the Metro's blue line in Montreal, and development of electrified public transit in Quebec City.

Integrated Urban Revitalization (RUI)

The City of Laval has awarded a grant of \$ 189,000 to Laval's En-Droit, the Youth Advisory Bureau and the Chomedey Local Development Committee. The three consultation partners will be adequately funded to ensure the continuity of the integrated urban revitalization (RUI) projects in the Pont-Viau, Place Saint-Martin / Domaine Renaud and Chomedey sectors for the period between April 1st and December 31st 2018.

Last year February of 2017 the City of Laval concluded an agreement with the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Land Occupancy (MAMOT) under the budget of the Funds for Initiatives and Outreach of the metropolitan area (FIRM) for a two-year period ending March 31st 2018. In November of 2017 the City of Laval submitted a new application for funding under the FIRM for the renewal of the agreement for another three years. The response from MAMOT is expected in the fall of 2018 therefore the subsidy granted by Laval will prevent an interruption of the services arranged by the three revitalization project partners.

Fight against Asian carp

The City of Laval will invest \$ 11,000 to join the Alliance of Great Lakes and St. Lawrence Cities. This group of American and Canadian cities is particularly interested in the protection of aquatic ecosystems and the fight against invasive species, including Asian carp. The latter was accidentally introduced into some US rivers in the 1970s, and now accounts for 90% of animal biomass in the natural lakes and waterways. This has resulted in a significant loss of local biodiversity. If nothing is done, this fish could seriously harm the aquatic ecosystem of Laval and even replace local popular fish such as bass, pike, or shad. In order to prevent this invasion, the Alliance is working with the various participants to establish a separation system between the Mississippi River, where Asian carp is present, and the Great Lakes-5t. Lawrence basin.

\$ 20,000 to the Laval Literary Society

The members of the executive committee approved a grant of \$ 20,000 for the Société littéraire de Laval (Laval literary

society) for its operating budget for the year 2018. This support is granted to the organization as part of the annual financial assistance program in culturel.

ArtHist network, delegated programmer

The City will again entrust Réseau ArtHist with a mandate for the artistic programming of certain events planned for 2018 and will compensate them with a sum of \$218,326.05 (taxes included). The agreement concerns programming at the Center de la nature funded with \$174,486.07, Les Virees Patrimoniales receiving the amount of \$25,984.36 and programming for the Semaine lavalloise des Aînés (Seniors Week) with a grant of \$17,855.62

Funding for Laval's science museums

Laval Mayor Marc Demers hailed the injection of \$ 1.325M by the Quebec government as one-time financial assistance to three of Laval's four science museums.

"We must recognize the government's effort and willingness to provide one-off transition assistance for scientific museology. It is a specific niche where the museum institutions of Laval meet. I thank the Ministers Dominique Anglade and Marie Montpetit for their action in a vision of shared responsibility between their respective departments and which, thus, gives its importance to the museum niche in which Laval has specialized. It was time to assume that scientific museology is a cornerstone for the knowledge society, "said Mayor Marc Demers.

Raising the importance of encouraging scientific museology, the mayor recalled that this investment consolidates the activities of these institutions whose influence is metropolitan, or even national. "These are scientific museums that must be a source of pride for the people of Laval and all of Quebec, if we consider that these metropolitan facilities have a reputation that, for the Cosmodôme for example, exceeds our borders," said the Mayor of Laval..

The distribution of sums and the amounts awarded include; Cosmodome - Space Camp Canada \$ 650,000, Armand-Frappier Museum \$ 450,000 and Eco-Nature - Rivière-des-Mille-Îles Park \$ 225,000 for a total of \$ 1,325,000

"These amounts come at the right time to support the work

of our teams who, through their dedication and professionalism, participate in the daily development of the scientific culture. Our museum institutions are lighthouses that develop a critical spirit worthy of the 21st century and allows the people of Laval especially the youth to cultivate a thirst for the sciences, "said Aram Elagoz, District Councilor Renaud and responsible for museums Laval scientists.

Laval's cultural rendezvous for toddlers


Laval Petits bonheurs festival program has arrived. The ninth edition will be held from May $4^{\rm th}$ to $13^{\rm th}$ 2018 and will take place in several neighborhoods. The goal of this cultural happening is to introduce toddlers often for the first time to the arts.

(TLN) The City of Laval's economic development department says a mission undertaken in the southeast United States by four local businesses involved in automobiles and specialized vehicles from March 11 - 16 has proven to be successful.

Valuable contacts

According to the city, the businesses made some 40 contacts with companies that included E-Z-Go (Textron), Kubota, Stabilus, BMW, Michelin and Proterra. The companies are said to have been interested in doing business and the Laval firms are waiting to hear whether they become regular suppliers.

The southeast U.S. is known to be a region that is a key component for the automobile industry and special truck sector. North and South Carolina alone have between them nearly 400 businesses in this sector. Laval's economic development department focused on the region for the economic mission for this reason.

A global outlook

The economic growth and the prosperity of Laval go hand in hand with the globalization of businesses," said Mayor Marc Demers. "This mission was profitable for our suppliers of products and services, as they were able to

profit from important customers with orders from the special vehicles sector to develop this market which has great potential."

The Laval companies that took part in the mission were Creaform Ingénierie, a company specialized in 3D engineering solutions; Imbritech Industries, which machines steel, plastic and bronze parts for the paper, aviation, hydroelectric and transportation industries; MFSTek, which manufactures and globally exports readyto-use chemical additives and custom industrial chemical formulations; and Odotrack, which furnishes solutions for tracking fleets of vehicles.



Women gather for first anniversary of 'Equal Voice' Quebec

Politics impacts women in office - including their family life

Members of the Quebec chapter of Equal Voice, a national organization that encourages women to run for elected office, heard during a gathering in Pont-Viau on March 22 about the experiences of two women in particular who've become well-known in municipal politics in Laval and Montreal over the past few years.

Issues brought forth

It was the first anniversary of Equal Voice's Quebec chapter. Two of the evening's scheduled speakers - Manitoba NDP MP Niki Ashton and Eva Nassif, Liberal MP for the Laval riding of Vimy - were unable to make it because of House of Commons business that obliged them to be in Ottawa.

Among the issues affecting women politicians that were discussed by a panel during the gathering were maternity leave, conflicts between work obligations and personal responsibilities, and the fact that female elected representatives often don't have access to the same benefits as their counterparts working in other professions.

Changing the system

These are common problems," former Ahuntsic Liberal MP Eleni Bakopanos, who sits on the national board of Equal Voice as treasurer, said in an interview with the Laval News. "How does one change the system to accommodate family responsibilities? This is one of the issues we're tackling."

While Bakopanos said that during her years in office, her husband made many sacrifices (such as turning down work promotions and not travelling in order to accommodate her

demanding hours as an MP), she also acknowledged that "you cannot take maternity leave as an elected person. Let's be clear. It's a choice you've made and once you're elected it's not a 9-to-5 job. It's public service."

Virginie Dufour's experience

Addressing the 18 or so women at the gathering, Laval city councillor for Sainte-Rose (and executive-committee member) Virginie Dufour recounted the beginning of her career in municipal politics around 2009, when the Mouvement Lavallois was still in its infancy and four years away from being elected to its first term in office.

That year, according to Dufour, she campaigned while pregnant, although neither she nor the ML succeeded in capturing the voters' imaginations. By 2013 when it was time for another municipal election, she finally won, as did the ML which gained the overwhelming majority of council seats. By this time, Dufour had two small children to care for, although her husband at the time provided a lot of support.

Received spouse's support

While she eagerly accepted her appointment to the executive-committee, Dufour said she was unprepared for the demands of the position and found herself working lengthy hours that she had never before imagined. "Without my partner it would have been disastrous," she said.

Although she acknowledged her husband's support, she said that at one point she felt a strong need to refocus attention on her family. "Unfortunately, it turned out not to be enough," Dufour said, "and we separated around a yearand-a-half ago and for around a year it's been shared custody." In 2017, she waged another election campaign, finding it easier this time

around to arrange her life without having to "feel guilty" each time her civic duties drew her away.

"I think that women generally - and I get this impression when I speak with other women - have this sense of guilt, which we really shouldn't have," she said, noting that during election campaigns she never ran into a male candidate who felt guilty about not being at home with his family.

Impact on Thuillier's life

The second featured speaker, Ahuntsic-Cartierville Borough Mayor Émilie Thuillier, who was first elected to Montreal City Council in 2009, said politics was first and foremost a choice she made, although at one point over the past nine years it started to conflict with her family life. Eventually, she admitted, it opened a rift between herself and her spouse.

"It's hard to find someone who shares the same enthusiasm as one's self for political life," she said. At the same time, she pointed out that for the first time in the City of Montreal's 375-year history, 10 of the city's 19 borough mayors are women, while 53 of the 103 city councillors are also women, "It's important but not something to be taken for granted,"



Parade Marshall Leitão

"I'm very honoured to have been given this invitation," Leitão told Newsfirst Multimedia. Among those joining Leitão on the reviewing stand was the country's Prime Minister Justin Trudeau, who was Parade Marshall in last year's Greek Independence Day Parade.

Great day for a parade

The incident occurred after police made a dynamic entry into a seventh-floor apartment during a planned drug raid. A 36-year-old man in the apartment rushed out to the balcony, tossed something to a neighbour's balcony before attempting unsuccessfully to make the leap across to another 7th floor balcony. He fell to the ground, and was pronounced dead shortly after. Ten investigators from the BEI were dispatched to the scene.

Driver of Fatal Car Crash Arrested

March 29 - Laval police arrested a 21-year-old man involved in a fatal car crash that occurred last May on Boul. des Laurentides.

Following a 10-month investigation of the deadly crash, officers arrested Simon Lefebyre last Wednesday. Police allege he was the driver responsible for the high-speed collision that killed the passenger in the suspect's vehicle and seriously injured the driver of the other car.

Lefebvre faces charges of impaired driving, dangerous driving causing death and criminal

Arson Suspected at Chomedey Vape Shop

March 27 - Laval police are investigating a suspected case of arson at a Chomedey Vape Shop on Boul. Curé-Labelle. Emergency services were dispatched to the scene of an early morning fire after a 911 call was placed at 4:47 a.m. by a passer-by who noticed smoke and flames coming from the shop.

Four fire trucks were deployed and they rolled up to the burning locale minutes later.

The Laval arson investigators were called in to take over the case after firefighters discovered a broken window at the premises that had been smashed before their arrival.

No injuries were reported. Police have not identified any suspects yet.

Fire Roasts Ste-Rose Resto

March 23 - A fire broke out early Friday morning at Restaurant Chez AlexSim, located on Curé-Labelle in Sainte-Rose. A passer-by

noticed smoke coming from the building and alerted 911 at 2:12 a.m.

Firefighters arrived on the scene within 5minutes. They observed flames coming from the first floor at the back of the building. According to Laval fire department, the fire started in the kitchen. The intense heat caused damage to both the first and second floors, which also suffered some water damage.

The blaze was extinguished by 3:15 a.m. Twenty-three firefighters were involved in the dousing effort. No one was in the restaurant at the time of the fire, and no injuries were reported.

Damages are estimated at \$150,000 for the building, as well as \$175,000 to equipment, inventory, and supplies.

Firefighters were unable to determine the cause of the fire, so the case was transferred to Laval's arson investigators.

Beware: Fraudsters nose as Canada Revenu Agency in tax season text message scam

One of the trickiest types of fraud to detect revolves around tax matters. Scam artists are known to present to business owners as the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA).

Many people feel their heart skip a beat when they see or hear the words "Canada Revenue Agency," so this gives fraudsters an opening to prey on this sensitivity.

Recently, there has been an increase in telephone scams where the caller claims to be from the CRA but is not — these calls are fraudulent and could result in identity / financial theft.

Tips so you'll know if it's really the CRA

Tax season is just around the corner! At this time of year, it's possible that the CRA will contact you by phone for legitimate tax reasons - here's what you should know:

The CRA may: validate your identity by asking for certain personal information (e.g., your full name, date of birth, your address and, in the case of a business, details about your account).

The CRA will not: ask for information about your passport, health card, or driver's license.

The CRA may: email you a link to a CRA

webpage, form, or publication in response to your telephone enquiry.

The CRA will not: email you a link requesting ou fill in an online form with personal financial information.

The CRA may: send you a notice of assessment or re-assessment by mail or notify you by email when it is available to view in My Account, My Business Account, or Represent a Client.

The CRA will not: send you a link to your refund by email or text message.

The CRA may: ask for financial information

such as the name of your bank and its location.

The CRA will not: set up an in-person meeting in a public place to take payment. The CRA may: request payment for a tax debt

through any of the CRA's payment options.

The CRA will not: demand immediate payment by prepaid credit card. The CRA may: take legal action to recover the

money you owe if you refuse to pay your debt.

The CRA will not: threaten you with immediate arrest or prison sentence.

If you get harassed contact the police.

Stella Artois recalls bottled beer sold in Canada for possible broken glass

Canadian dates range from Feb. 20, 2018, to Sept. 26, 2018.

CBC- Stella Artois says it's recalling beer packaged in 330 millilitre glass bottles as a safety precaution.

The company says some bottles have a flaw that may cause a small piece of glass to break off and possibly fall into the beer.

Stella Artois said the bottles were manufactured by one of its many suppliers, which wasn't identified. The company says it is recalling less than one per cent of all bottled beer it sells in North American every year, and the number of impacted bottles is likely to be a fraction of that one per cent.

The safety of our consumers is our top priority," brand vice-president Christina Choi said. "While the number of potentially affected glass bottles is very small, we are recalling these Stella Artois packages as a precautionary measure.

The recall applies to packages of six, 12, 18 and 24 bottles of Stella Artois and "Best of Belgium" multi-packs sold in the U.S. and Canada. The recalls also apply to Stella Artois Legere six and 12 packs sold in the United

The affected packages have codes 49, 52, or 55 and best-before dates ranging from Feb. 13, 2018, to Feb. 2, 2019. The Canadian dates range from Feb. 20, 2018, to Sept. 26, 2018.

Besides advising consumers to return packages covered by the warning for a reimbursement, the company is working with distributors and retailers to remove packages that could be affected.

The recall doesn't affect other Stella Artois packaging formats, such as cans or draft or bottles with any other production codes.

City grants \$21,180 subsidy to **Mieux-Naître in Laval**

Quebec should support prenatal services organization, says mayor

(TLN) On March 23, the City of Laval's executive-committee granted a subsidy of \$21,180 to Mieux-Naître in Laval, a non-profit organization that provides prenatal services to expectant mothers and parents.

A need in Laval

Since there are already 18 prenatal services centres in various areas of Quebec, Mayor Marc Demers wondered why there have been none until up to now in Laval, "a region where the birth rate is the highest in Quebec," he said.

This financial support will allow Mieux-Naître in Laval to pursue its representations to decicision-makers in order to obtain recurring support that is equitable for Laval's families. while assuring the continuation of a service that is essential," said the mayor.

'A right,' says Desmeules

Since 2012, Mieux-Naître in Laval has been offering services to appreciative young families in Laval. There are approximately 4,000 births annually in Laval.

"Every day, women and their partners who are expecting a child or who hope to start a family in Laval have every right to receive prenatal services just as everyone else in Quebec can," said Laval executive-committee member Sandra Desmeules, the city councillor for the district of Bois-de-Boulogne.

Essential support

We are not about to allow the comforting light represented by Mieux-Naître in Laval to go out. It is therefore essential that we offer to this organization the support to allow it to obtain recurring and equitable financial assistance so that it can pursue its mission."

In October 2017, Laval city council passed a resolution asking the Quebec government to provide recurring financial support to Mieux-Naître in Laval comparable to the support received by other prenatal centres elsewhere in Quebec. With the latest subsidy, the City of Laval has given the organization \$60,000, although Laval is still waiting for the government to step in with its own support.

How can I let go of the guilt I feel for hurting someone else?

You moved him from boyfriend to boy friend. You two were together in an attempt to find love. On your end, it failed. Your only mistake was having casual sex with him instead of making a clean break. That sent you into an iffy zone that has no future.

Now he is using that to rewrite the kind of person you are and to suggest you were doing what you were not. He's telling you what he thinks of you: you are a cheat.






